Biographical Note

Wilfred Ross Easterbrooks (1894-1968) was born in South Kingstown, Rhode Island, on August 25, 1894. He attended Rhode Island State College and graduated with a Bachelor of Science in 1917. Following his graduation, Easterbrooks enlisted in the U.S. Army and served as a Private First Class in Battery A of the 103rd Field Artillery Regiment.

In late 1917 Easterbrooks's regiment was deployed to France, where it participated in several major battles of World War I. Easterbrooks was wounded in September 1918 while serving as a motorcycle dispatch bearer. He was not able to receive needed treatment for this injury for several months, resulting in blood poising and "a narrow escape from losing his leg." According to the *Narragansett Times*, Easterbrooks was the only serviceman from South Kingstown to be seriously wounded in World War I.

Following his military service, Easterbrooks married Mary Rose Albro and remained engaged in veteran's organizations. Easterbrooks served as postmaster of the Wakefield Post Office for twelve years and then worked as a civil engineer until the early 1960s. He was also a member of the Pettaquamscutt Historical Society, now the Center, at the time of his death.

Scope and Content

The Wilfred Ross Easterbrooks Collection includes objects, papers, and photographs. The materials document Easterbrooks's military service during World War I. These include telegrams and correspondence between the American Red Cross and Mary Albro informing her of Easterbrooks's location and condition. Photographs in the collection document fighting on the front lines in France, including trench warfare and camp life, and Easterbrooks's recovery. The series is organized as follows:
